

Neighborhood Conservation Overlay District

One of West Plaza's major assets is our intact stock of early 20th century houses, which gives our neighborhood an architectural character unique in Kansas City. You could say that in West Plaza we have been given a gift. Other neighborhoods originally looked very similar to ours but saw their architectural cohesion destroyed by developments that did not fit the scale or style of the surrounding buildings.

With the exception of a few blocks east of Roanoke Parkway, West Plaza has managed to avoid that fate, but as property values rebound in the coming years, the possibility of such developments increases. Neglected properties in our neighborhood (and we do have our share of these) can be purchased inexpensively, torn down and a larger building put up in its place. No neighborhood in Kansas City has been immune.

Plaza-Westport, Volker, 49/63, even Prairie Village and Brookside are all dealing with this issue. It is our hope that we can keep West Plaza one step ahead of the game and preserve our architectural gift for ourselves and for future West Plaza residents. One way of doing that is through a new zoning tool known as a Neighborhood Conservation Overlay District (NCOD).

The NCOD is a tool designed to protect and preserve an area's cultural, architectural, and aesthetic ambiance by limiting the flexibility of the underlying zoning designation. It is a neighborhood-specific set of standards, determined by the residents, that works in conjunction with existing zoning regulations. The goal is to encourage development that effectively matches the density or established character of the neighborhood.

NCODs are driven by a set of neighborhood-developed design guidelines that may be as loose or restrictive as a neighborhood chooses, but must reflect the consistent building design in the neighborhood. In West Plaza, we have a "live and let live" philosophy, and we could opt for a set of very general design features based on our existing buildings. Those might include a building's size, scale, and massing (massing refers to the combination of a building's footprint and number of stories). From an architect's standpoint, a great deal of design flexibility remains possible while adhering to these general restrictions.

Once an NCOD district is in place, a certificate of appropriateness from the Overlay Design Review Board or KCMO Planning and Development Director must be obtained prior to the issuance of any building permit. Each building permit application for new construction or exterior alteration must comply with the NCOD standards.

The WPNA is currently exploring whether an NCOD is right for West Plaza, and we will discuss the issue at our July and September general membership meetings. We welcome your input at wpnakc@gmail.com. ■

Park Partnerships

In Kansas City, we enjoy the best of both worlds: the rich density of urban life and the wide open “green” spaces provided by our beautiful parks and boulevards.

The construction in our own Westwood Park is showing great progress. The jogging trail is finished, and so is the new shelter house in the southwest corner, complete with a fire pit for the winter sledding crowd. The panoramic view from the new shelter is well worth a visit. The baseball infield has been reconditioned, and a new water fountain has been installed near the playground. These improvements are all courtesy of the Kansas City Parks and Recreation Department, part of a long-range plan that was initiated when Paul Minto was West Plaza president.

A number of other enhancements have been provided by our good friends to the south, the Westwood Park Homes Association. Near the corner of State Line and 47th Street are two park benches, a small grove of pine trees, and a sign identifying Westwood Park. Recently, the WPHA hired a professional landscaping service to plant a bed of ornamental shrubs and roses there, and to trim all the trees in the park at their own expense. They have repainted and refurbished the sign, and other plantings are proposed throughout the park. Our hats are off to Westwood Park volunteer Ann Nixon, who directed these efforts.

Meanwhile, West Plaza Gardener-in-Chief Ed O'Donnell and volunteers Sharon Pendleton, Joe Padilla, and others have made good progress in the West Plaza Garden at 46th and Jarboe. Now in its second year, the Garden's cheerful flowers welcome visitors to the neighborhood. Construction of a small monument-style identifying marker will begin soon at the north end of the garden.

Each of these projects represents a tangible result of the dedication and hard work on the part of your neighborhood associations and the Kansas City Missouri Parks Department. They are good examples of what can be accomplished when we all pitch in to help. These things would not have happened without a major commitment from the Parks Department and the generous participation of our neighbors, who donated their own time, money, and labor. Many thanks to each and every one of you. ■

One of Kansas City's Better Kept Secrets...

...is about your sidewalk and driveway. If they become deteriorated and unsafe, it's your responsibility as the homeowner to repair or replace them, and even if you are going to do the repair yourself, you must file a permit with the city.

To get the permit, you have two choices: buy a two-year performance and maintenance bond specific to the work performed, OR file a Certificate of Insurance form and a Request for Bond Waiver form with the city, which will result in the issuance of the requested permit.

Your homeowner's insurance company will complete these latter two forms for you. By completing these two forms, you waive the requirement for a performance bond, and your liability will be raised if necessary to \$500,000 and your insurance company will be named as an additional insured on your homeowner's policy. Most homeowner's policies provide \$300,000 of liability coverage. If it has to be raised above that level, the additional premium is generally around \$25.00.

Listed below are the phone numbers and names of the current permit department. The names may change, but the phone numbers won't. Dealing with the city takes time because this department is almost overwhelmed by the process of issuing permits of all kinds.

I have the required forms and will be glad to guide you through the process of getting that permit for your bumpy sidewalk. Call me at 816-753-4334. ■

A Brief History of the West Plaza

In 1834, the Missouri State Line was the western boundary of the United States, and the vast area beyond was wide open "Territory." It was in that year that John Calvin McCoy, a trained surveyor, first platted out the Town of Westport, drawing imaginary lines and boundaries to mark the city streets and dividing the area into building lots. Because it was ideally situated as the "jumping off" point for the great westward migration down the Santa Fe Trail, McCoy believed Westport would soon become the "gateway to the West." Kansas City did not exist back then; there was just a little notch in the riverbank where the steamboats docked called "Westport Landing." Today this "notch" may still be seen at the foot of Grand Avenue, by the piers of the old ASB Bridge.

It turned out that McCoy was right. From the early 1840s until 1869, thousands of pioneers arrived in Westport on steamboats and then headed West in covered wagons down the Westport Road and Santa Fe Trail. Westport merchants provided wagons, oxen, and supplies, and the little town prospered for 35 years until the completion of the Transcontinental Railway in 1869 made wagon trains obsolete.

As Westport's glory faded, the new "Town of Kansas" that had sprung up along the river bank in the 1850s soon eclipsed Westport, its economy fueled by railroads and the industries that railroads made possible: lumber, meatpacking, agricultural implements, and all manner of manufacturing. With its expanding population, Kansas City grew rapidly to the south, annexing Westport in 1898. West Plaza was now part of Kansas City, and it would soon attract the attention of builders and developers.

Land ownership is recorded in a document called a title abstract, maintained at the county courthouse. When Jackson County's records went digital in the 1990s, many of these priceless paper records were destroyed, but luckily for us, our friend and neighbor, Louise Birt, retrieved hers, and kindly loaned it to me. This document is a written record of each time the title to the land was transferred or disputed, and it contains a treasure trove of interesting details.


The record of Mrs. Birt's property begins even earlier than McCoy's first pencil lines. Until 1807, Missouri was part of the French Louisiana Territory, which a cash-strapped Napoleon Bonaparte sold to the United States to finance his European wars. Aside from the few French fur trappers, frontiers-

men, and Native Americans who lived here, no one knew the extent of the Louisiana Territory, not even Napoleon, who sold it, or Thomas Jefferson, who bought it. Fortunately, Jefferson convinced a skeptical Congress that it was a pretty good deal for \$15 million (about 3 cents per acre). That same year, Robert Fulton's invention of the steamboat made it possible to navigate upstream on the Mississippi and Missouri Rivers. Enough pioneering frontier families were settling in Missouri that it was admitted to the Union in 1821 as the 24th state. Shortly thereafter, in December 1831, Jackson County was organized.

The first entry in Mrs. Birt's title abstract is the land patent, dated April 2, 1829, indicating the "N.W. fractional ¼ of Section 30, Twp. 49, Range 33, Jackson County, Missouri" belonging to A. P. Patterson. Andrew P. Patterson died a short time later, leaving a widow, Rachael, and seven children. Because Patterson died without a will, Mrs. Patterson had to petition the court for her inheritance, producing witnesses to her claims. Ultimately, the court determined that ownership would pass to Mrs. Patterson and her adult children. In the course of events, the property was surveyed, and the surveyor was none other than John C. McCoy. Gradually, Mrs. Patterson and at least three of her children sold off bits and pieces of the family farm to Louis Vogel, whose family owned it until long after his death in 1879.

In 1904, Louis Vogel, Jr. sold his part of the farm to the newly incorporated Charter Oak Lot Company, which then formed a subdivision they named "Vogel Heights No. 3," and platted out the 217 lots that many of our homes are built on today. If your home is located between State Line and Fairmount, between Westport Road and 47th Street, you are living on part of the old Vogel homestead, and that is why it says "Vogel Heights" on your tax bill. (Except for a few recent additions, most of the homes in West Plaza were built between 1906 and 1930.) In February 1906, Charter Oak sold Vogel Heights to the Bargain Realty Company.

We live in a neighborhood with a rich history. Thanks, Louise, for preserving this part of it. ■

November 2010: The General election for the Missouri House, Missouri Senate, US Senate, US Congress, and Jackson County Legislature.

February 2011: Kansas City, MO City Council and Mayoral primary election

March 2011: Kansas City, MO City Council and Mayoral general election

If you want to look up the candidates in the races, the West Plaza is in the following districts:

Missouri House – 39th District

Missouri Senate – 10th District

Jackson County Legislature – 1st District (we can also vote in all "at large" races)

City Council – 4th District (we can also vote in all "at large" races)

No matter who you support, exercise your constitutional duty and get to the polls to vote. ■

After adding a new patio to our 100-year-old home on Fairmount, we immediately invited over as many people as possible to celebrate. One of them was my good friend Chef Linda of Price Chopper and Fox 4 News fame. She brought her amazing sangria recipe, and I just had to share it with everybody! There's no better way to celebrate summer.

White Sangria

1 bottle of pinot grigio or chenin blanc (something w/ pear undertones)

2 T sugar

2 T triple sec

1 orange, sliced

2 pears, sliced

1 lemon, sliced

1 stick of cinnamon

10 oz soda water

Combine all ingredients except soda water into a pitcher. Let sit in refrigerator for several hours to absorb flavors. Before serving, add the soda water. Serve over ice. ■

Safety Tip from Jim Schriever, KCPD

Many people are unknowingly putting their property and possibly themselves at risk by announcing an out of town trip or discussing an upcoming vacation on social networking sites. Often when I send out the daily crime report, I receive automatic responses that the person is out of town and/or on vacation.

Keep in mind that announcing your plans on social sites and e-mail responses are an invitation to criminals. To protect yourself, write in your auto-responses that you are "unavailable" during that time period, and do not give vacation dates or specific plans on social networking sites. Trust me, for those who are computer savvy, it is easy to gain entry to invitation-only social sites where many are putting information about their daily activities.

City Offers Tips To Keep Pets Safe

Kansas City Missouri Animal Health and Public Safety and Spay & Neuter Kansas City are offering residents tips to help keep pets safe from abduction. In addition to having a current photo of a pet on hand and keeping microchip information and identification tags up to date, owners should use the following guidelines:

- Secure the yard, fence, and gates.
- Never leave your dog unattended. It takes only a moment to untie him and lead him off.
- Be aware of and make sure neighbors are aware of the problem of pet theft
- Let neighbors know if you are expecting people on your property when you are not around.
- Never allow your dog to roam free.
- Spaying and neutering your pet deters the pet from roaming.
- Never leave a pet unattended in a car.
- Make sure your pet always wears a collar with ID tags.
- Contact a veterinarian about implanting a microchip for identification.
- Keep recent photos of pets, taken from different angles, that clearly show coat type and coloring, close-ups of the face, and any exceptional physical characteristics.
- Keep all your proof-of-ownership papers in one place to prove ownership.

While losing a pet can be traumatic for the entire family, mistreating a pet is against the law and carries a severe penalty. During hot summer months, owners are required to provide adequate shelter and shade for pets. If animals are found outside without adequate shelter and shade from the elements, owners will be cited for animal cruelty. This offense carries a minimum fine of \$250 and a maximum fine of \$500 with 180 days in jail. If a pet owner cannot immediately bring an animal inside or take the animal to a place of safety during the hot summer months, the animal will be impounded.

Extreme hot temperature advice

- Limit pets' outside time for bathroom breaks during extreme hot temperatures.
- Never leave a pet alone in a vehicle, as vehicles get very hot quickly.
- Increase food and water supplies for pets that spend time playing outside.

To report animal cruelty or any other animal-related issues contact the City's 3-1-1 Action Center by dialing 311 or 816-513-1313. After hours and weekends, call 911. If you suspect your dog has been stolen or to report suspicious activity, call the police. ■

- Ask for a security escort if you are alone at a shopping center.
- Watch out for young males loitering in the area (handing out flyers, etc.).
- If someone tries to approach you, change direction or run to a busy store.
- As you approach your vehicle, look under, around, and inside your car.
- If it is safe, open the door, enter quickly, and lock the doors.
- Make it a habit to always start your car and drive away immediately.
- In the city, always drive with your car doors locked and windows rolled up.
- When stopped in traffic, leave room ahead to maneuver and escape.
- If you are bumped in traffic by young males, be suspicious of the accident. It may be a setup.
- Beware of the Good Samaritan who offers to repair a flat tire. It's okay to accept help, but be alert: wave that you will follow, and drive to a gas station or busy place before getting out of your car.
- If you are confronted by an armed carjacker, don't resist. Give up your keys or money if demanded without resistance.
- Don't argue, fight, or chase the robber. You can be seriously injured.
- Never agree to be kidnapped. Drop the car keys, run, and scream for help.
- If you are forced to drive, consider crashing the car near a busy intersection to attract attention so bystanders can help and call the police.
- Call the police immediately to report the crime and provide detailed information. ■

Excess Trash Tag Rates to Change

July 1

Effective July 1, the cost for Excess Trash Tags will increase from \$1 to \$2. The rate change helps offset the cost of excess trash collection. Trash tags purchased prior to July 1 are still valid and only one is needed per excess trash bag.

An excess trash tag must be placed on each bag of trash that exceeds the city's 2-bag weekly limit. Residents wishing to reduce their reliance on excess trash tags are reminded that the city provides unlimited curbside recycling, which is an effective method for reducing the amount of trash placed curbside in trash bags. Excess Trash Tags are available at participating Westlake Ace Hardware and Price Chopper stores. ■
