Topic: Sewers! KC Water Services

Kansas City Water Services is in the process of making infrastructure improvements in the sewer system through their Overflow Control Program. The goal of this 22-year project, begun in 2010, is to reduce combined sewer overflows by 88% and to eliminate overflows in the separate sewer system. Every water customer pays for these improvements through the wastewater portion of their monthly bill, and the department is committed to keeping us informed of their progress.

In addition, Judy Morgan, our State Representative, will spend a few moments updating us on the latest legislative session in Jefferson City.

We will begin taking nominations for our annual election of officers and board members at this meeting. If you are thinking about increasing your participation in neighborhood activities and you want to help guide the future of the West Plaza, this is the time to throw your hat into the ring.

If you have not joined the WPNA or have not yet renewed your membership for 2013, you may do so at the meeting. We accept cash or check.

New Tax Status for the WPNA

West Plaza Neighborhood Association has always been a volunteer organization, devoting all of its resources and energy toward neighborhood betterment. Unlike the J.C. Nichols neighborhoods, where membership in the Homes Associations are mandatory and the dues much higher, West Plaza operates on a strictly volunteer basis, charging a mere \$12 a year dues per household and \$7 for seniors.

We have no paid employees, and since its inception in 1973, WPNA has operated as a "not-for-profit" organization. Because we make no profit, we are not required to pay income taxes. This set-up has worked well for the past 40 years, and we have managed to make some important neighborhood improvements with the little revenue we receive.

In order to put the Association on a more sound financial footing for the future, we have recently applied for and received 501(c)(3) tax status from the Internal Revenue Service. This was a very complicated and lengthy process, involving many pages of IRS documents that needed to be filled out in great detail. But obtaining the new tax status was an important step forward, because it allows us to receive donations on a tax-free basis. Anyone wishing to make a contribution to WPNA can now do so, and the contribution is entirely tax-deductible. ■

Theft from Auto Still a Problem



Theft from vehicle, although one of the most easily preventable crimes, continues to be a persistent problem for our neighborhood as well as many others in Kansas City. Theft of valuables from a vehicle occurs on the street, in parking lots, on

driveways, and even inside garages. Thieves will often break windows or punch locks to gain entry, but will also enter unlocked vehicles that contain valuables in plain view. Common targets are stereos, laptops, cell phones, purses, and wallets.

Prevention Tips

- **Do not leave valuables in plain view in your car, no matter where you park.** It only takes a few seconds for a thief to smash your window and grab anything visible.
- Place all valuables in your trunk before reaching your destination or take them with you.
- Lock your car and park in a well-lit area if on the street. If you park in your driveway, install a motion detection light system.
- Report any suspicious activity that you see in the neighborhood. Call 9-1-1.

It's not socially acceptable to blame victims of crime, and in most cases, there's good reason for that. However, if you leave valuables in plain sight, you are attracting criminals, both to your car and to the neighborhood. Criminals will go where it's easy to steal. So use common sense, and, as Officer Schriever tells us, if you must leave items in your car, at least "put your junk in your trunk." ■

Forks & Rakes by Stephanie Murrell & Ed O'Donnell

Recipe: Dry-Brined Turkey Moist Inside, Crispy Outside

Total time: 2 hours, 50 minutes

Servings: 11 to 15

Note: Start early! This is a 3-day process.

This is more a technique than a recipe. It makes a bird that has concentrated turkey flavor and fine, firm flesh and is delicious. And you can add other flavors, such as minced rosemary, if you wish.

1 (12- to 16-pound) turkey; Kosher salt

1. Wash the turkey inside and out, pat it dry, and weigh it. Measure 1 tablespoon of salt into a bowl for every 5 pounds.
2. Sprinkle the inside of the turkey lightly with salt. Place the turkey on its back and salt the breast, concentrating the salt in the center, where the meat is thickest. Use a little more than a tablespoon. It should look liberally seasoned, but not over-salted.
3. Turn the turkey on one side and sprinkle the entire side with salt, concentrating on the thigh. Use a little less than a tablespoon. Flip the turkey over and do the same with the opposite side.
4. Place the turkey in a 2-1/2 gallon sealable plastic bag, press out the air, and seal tightly. Place the turkey breast-side up in the refrigerator. Chill for 3 days, turning it onto its breast for the last day.
5. Remove the turkey from the bag. There should be no salt visible on the surface and the skin should be moist but not wet. Place the turkey breast-side up on a plate and refrigerate uncovered for at least 8 hours.
6. On the day it is to be cooked, remove the turkey from the refrigerator and leave it at room temperature at least 1 hour. Preheat the oven to 425 degrees.
7. Place the turkey breast-side down on a roasting rack in a roasting pan; put it in the oven. After 30 minutes, remove the pan from the oven and carefully turn the turkey over so the breast is facing up (it's easiest to do this by hand, using kitchen towels or oven mitts).
8. Reduce the oven temperature to 325 degrees, return the turkey to the oven. and roast until a thermometer inserted in the deepest part of the thigh, but not touching the bone, reads 165 degrees, about 2-3/4 hours total roasting time.
9. Remove the turkey from the oven, transfer it to a warm platter or carving board; tent loosely with foil. Let stand at least 30 minutes to let the juices redistribute through the meat. Carve and serve. ■

West Plaza Garden Report: The Year of the Sunflower...and the Long Awaited Faucet!

Last year I planted sunflowers: a few mammoth, a few petite, a few with bright yellow petals, and a few with almost white petals. Because of the drought they were just so-so. But they were healthy enough to produce seed, which neither the birds nor the squirrels ate. The winter snow provided moisture for them, so in spring we had lots of volunteer seedlings.

The leaves of a seedling sunflower are distinctive (wide and flat). I let too many of them grow, thinking I would thin them later. By the time "later" arrived, I didn't have the heart to remove a plant that was about to bloom. The bees started to pollinate them. It was shocking how many bumblebees were buzzing around the place! Then the goldfinches started feeding. Some West Plaza folks even asked about harvesting the seeds. Recently the blossoms have started to turn crispy. As readers of my column know, sunflowers are in the Garden not just because of their value to nature, but because West Plaza residents enjoy them. They will continue to be an "annual" annual for many years to come....but not as crowded and haphazardly spaced.

Wasn't it back in 2009 that Joe Montanari put in a PIAC request for a water faucet for the garden? In September (yes, of 2013) the construction was completed. Though a few perennials were disrupted during the "planting" of the pipes, they will be replaced. Thanks go to Craig Cotton, whose condo allowed me to get badly needed water from them all these years. I carried water in buckets from the building to the Garden to supplement the water I carried in laundry soap bottles from my house (I'm not joking). Thanks also go to the patient folks who were not able to park on Jarboe during the construction. But most of all, HUGE thanks go to Joe Montanari for his persistence in making the faucet a reality.

Looking Back: KC's Nelly Don

Ellen Quinlan was way ahead of her time; she was a liberated woman long before anyone else. Nell, as her brothers and sisters called her, was born in Parsons, Kansas, in 1889, the twelfth of thirteen

children. She graduated from Parsons High School at age 16 and enrolled in Parsons Business College, where she took a course in stenography. The small town life was too slow for Nell, so she moved to Kansas City, where she met 23-year-old Paul Donnelly in the boarding house where she lived. Nell was 17 when she and Donnelly were married.

Nell soon enrolled at Lindenwood College in St. Charles, MO. After earning a degree in 1909, Nell returned to Kansas City. Nell found domestic life boring and amused herself by designing and making her own clothing. Kansas City in 1910 was hardly a fashion mecca, and most women of the day wore dowdy old "Mother Hubbard" style dresses. Not Nell. Nell's dresses were stylish and flattering, and soon her friends and neighbors were asking her to make dresses for them. Realizing that there was a strong demand for stylish women's dresses, Nell approached the Peck's Dry Goods Stores and left with an order for 18 dozen dresses. While the old fashioned dresses cost 69 cents, Nell's quickly sold out at the staggering sum of a dollar apiece.

Three years later, Nell formed the Donnelly Garment Company. By 1931, she employed more than 1,000 workers, with annual sales of \$3.5 million. By 1953, the Donnelly Garment Company was the largest dress manufacturer in the world, and Nell Donnelly was one of America's first female multi-millionaires.

In some ways, Nell's personal life was as adventurous as her business career. Although they maintained both their marriage and their business partnership until 1932, Nell and Paul Donnelly had been drifting apart for many years. While Paul pursued other women, Nell was attracted to her neighbor, U.S. Senator James A. Reed. In September 1931, while still married to Paul and pregnant with Reed's child, Nell sailed to Europe

on the pretext of "adopting" a child, and soon returned with a healthy baby boy, David. Barely three months later, on the evening of December 16, 1931, Nell and her chauffeur, George Blair, were kidnapped by three armed men, who demanded a \$75,000 ransom.

Kansas City was a wide open town in the 1930s, run by the Boss Tom Pendergast's political machine and its mob enforcer Johnny Lazia. The story is that Reed contacted Lazia, threatening to expose his illegal activities if Nell was not released within 24 hours. Although Lazia's men had nothing to do with the kidnapping, 25 carloads of them went searching for Nell. After 32 hours in captivity, Nell and Blair were released unharmed. The kidnapers were arrested, tried, and convicted. Nell divorced Donnelly the following year, and she and Reed were married.

Nell sold the Donnelly Garment Company in 1956. Without Nell's guidance, the company did not fare well, and it filed for bankruptcy in 1978. Ellen Quinlan Donnelly Reed died on September 8, 1991, at the age of 102. Today, when we think of women's fashions, New York, Paris, and Milan come to mind. But from 1910 to 1956, Kansas City's garment district was a major player, and "Nelly Don" was at the epicenter of it all. ■

Our bi-monthly newsletter is the primary way we stay in touch with our members and residents of the neighborhood. Creating it and delivering it requires quite a bit of effort on the part of many volunteers. Articles are written by board members and are edited and formatted into a newsletter by another board member. A pdf of the completed newsletter is emailed to those on our membership list; however, the journey of the printed version, which is hand delivered to the 1,100 residences in the West Plaza, has just begun. The proof is delivered to our local printer, Print Tekk, who prints 1,200 copies for us *without charge*.

In the meantime, two board members have been calling and/or emailing distribution volunteers to ascertain their availability. These two folks pick up the newsletters from the printer, figure out which volunteer will deliver which route, and then distribute the correct number of newsletters to the confirmed volunteers. The volunteers deliver the newsletters before the deadline, which is at least a week before the upcoming general meeting.

We are currently missing a few links in this chain. First, those two overworked board members who are making the calls *really* want to find a volunteer to do that job. (Yes, we know how much easier it would be to send out an email. But we also know how easy it is to put off responding to it!) Second, we are short a few distribution volunteers. Those same two board members have been taking up the slack by walking routes themselves, and they are getting TIRED!

The saying "many hands make light work" is very true in this situation. If we had a few more people to share the load, it would be easier for everyone.
